Silent Weekend Retreat for Men & Women

"Kindness: The Gift That Gives To The Giver"

What makes the difference between an act of kindness that fills us with abundant life physically, emotionally and spiritually or drains life (compassion fatigue with caregivers often collapsing)? This retreat applies the research on how kindness surprisingly heals the giver more than the receiver. Researchers verify that kindness lowers our blood pressure, raises immunity, accelerates the healing of wounds, slows down the aging process and can heal us more than exercise or stopping smoking. Without kindness toward ourselves and others, we suffer from compassion fatigue or are bound with the chains of depression, anxiety and addictions. This retreat will focus on the spiritual and psychological dynamics to heal our hurts and nurture our gift of kindness so we become fully alive now and forever.

Men & Women's Serra International Retreat

The Beginnings of the Retreat Center

1921

Joseph Lethert, founder of the prestigious St. Paul Accounting Firm, begins construction of the Lethert Family home on the property.

1951

The Oblates of Mary Immaculate complete negotiations for the purchase of the house and property for eventual use as a Retreat Center to be known as King's House.

September 24, 1952

Auxiliary Bishop James Byrne of Archdiocese of Saint Paul dedicates King's House of Retreats.
In 1966, the Archdiocese expanded their name to include Minneapolis.

September 26-28, 1952

The Charter Retreat for Men was conducted by Fr. Alphonse Simon, OMI.
Fr. Boniface L. Wittenbrink, OMI, was the director of the Retreat Center.

Retreats for men were held weekly on Friday night to Sunday night. Retreats for women were held weekly from Tuesday noon to Thursday noon. The house accommodated 28 people. There are several photo albums in the Garden Court and Lethert sitting area with pictures from this time period. At the time of the purchase only the main Tudor-style 30-room house was on the property along with a stone and brick tower that served as the water tower and was used to amplify the organ music across the lake. The three-manual organ was an extravagance by the Lethert family which was housed in what is now the Chandelier Room. Old photos show the pipes for the organ on the north wall and a fireplace on the south wall. The exterior chimney for this fireplace is still intact and can be seen in the Garden Court. At this time, a brook ran through the garden of the estate and had a small waterfall down to Buffalo Lake. The stairways down to the shore of the lake are still used today and were updated and reinforced in the 1990's. The Living Room of the Lethert house was used as the conference room for the retreats and is now part of the walkway from the reception area to the Garden Court. The Chandelier Room was used as the chapel until 1961.

1955

Construction began on the "cottages" which held dormitory sleeping rooms for retreatants with a bathroom on each floor. Two units were constructed, with 16 rooms per unit. The cottages were razed in 1996 for the construction of DeMazenod Hall, Joseph Hall guest rooms and the Oblate residence.

1956

Benedictine Sisters arrive from St. Joseph, Minnesota to manage the kitchen and meals at the retreat center. They were housed in a small cottage at the entrance way of King's House. A small chapel was added to the cottage for the sister's use. This cottage and chapel were razed as part of one of the many construction projects.

1960

Construction begins on the Main Chapel and Garden Court. The photo has the Front Gate and the "New Chapel" which was completed in 1961. The first Mass was offered on August 15, 1961, and dedicated to Christ the King.
